2025 SAF Award Recipients



Member Spotlight

Barbara Walker is a woman of surprises. So slim that folks have envied her size or worried that she was too fragile for the work that she did. Notwithstanding the appearance of fragility, Barbara chose what is considered one of the most dangerous careers: a job as a New York City police officer.

Barbara was born in North Carolina, but barring ten years of childhood, lived in New York for most of her life. It was where she went to high school, met her husband—at a high school social—and later married him, directly after graduation. He was three years older; and it was where she had her two sons.

Once married, Barbara dedicated herself to raising her family. So, it was a surprise then, when in the midst of being a homemaker and working at bank, her life took an unexpected turn.

The year was 1973 to be exact. Barbara was riding the subway with a friend after working an evening shift, when a transit officer who watched out for them whenever they rode the train at night, told her about the job of a transit officer, how easy it was, the many perks, and the very good pay. The next night he brought the application.

Barbara took the test, passed and entered the police academy. There was no thought in her mind of becoming a cop walking a beat.

She explains, "Back then, they didn't have too many female officers. There had been a pilot program in a couple of precincts with a few females performing patrol duties. The pilot was deemed a success and and classifications of uniformed personnel was changed from patrolman and policewoman to police officer."

The next NYPD hiring, which included Barbara, graduated the largest class of female recruits in NYPD history; the females outnumbered the males.

Barbara remembers the first night she was assigned to Harlem's 25th precinct—a precinct with a rough reputation. But it isn't the roughness of the neighborhood that springs to mind. It was the uniform she was wearing.

"Did you ever see those old movies with the female officers marching in neat little skirts, with the little caps that curled up in the back and the little white gloves? We had a purse with a little pocket for the gun. That was the uniform I had on," she says.

"I remember the sergeant at the precinct looking me up and down. I said, 'We told them to give us pants.'

In the morning he took me to the Army and Navy store. He got me a pair of pants and a pea jacket, pulled the patches off the shoulder of the lightweight jacket I was wearing and stuck them on the pea jacket. That became my uniform. Later that year the academy put us in the same uniform as the men."

Barbara patrolled the streets of Harlem and the Bronx off and on for the next twenty years. She fired her weapon at the police range and never shot anyone, though in dicey situations she occasionally pulled it out.

Throughout her career as an NYPD officer Barbara served in multiple roles: as a cop on the beat, in community policing, in background investigations, and as an instructor at the academy—the job she enjoyed the most because she liked developing the curriculum and teaching cops how to respond in real life situations.

She also worked as a cop on film sets like Brewster's Millions and 9 ½ Weeks, making sure that the films stayed within permit guidelines. While working, Barbara earned her bachelor's degree in behavioral sciences and later was promoted to an NYPD sergeant.

In 1993 she retired and briefly moved to California.

In 1996 Barbara moved to West Palm Beach after a visit with Elet Cyris, a friend. In Palm Beach County she met folks she'd known in New York, like Lawrence Logan who passed recently. They introduced her to a tight circle of friends who were the founding members of CAFCI, then known as the Caribbean American Friendship Club. She joined immediately and has been a member ever since.

A core group of CAFCI's members belonged to another club-Scratch-so called because they bought lottery cards together and scratched off the numbers to see if they'd won.)

In her three decades in Palm Beach County, Barbara has been a serial activist—belonging to the NAACP, the ACLU, the Urban League Guild, the League of Women Voters, and more recently, Coming to the Table, an organization comprised of the descendants of enslaved Africans and the descendants of European enslavers.

Hers has been a life of service.

Patrolling Harlem's streets she recalls, "It had a reputation, but the work was routine. No one bothered you. Nice little old ladies would say, 'You need to eat more.' How you gonna fight and protect yourself?'" She laughs, I'd say, 'Don't worry. I know how to fight.'"

The trajectory from where she started as a Black girl born in a rural town to becoming one of the first female street cops and an NYPD sergeant seems an unlikely one, but Barbara's demeanor betrays evidence of her vocation as a cop: a cool deportment, a steady hand, eyes watchful of all around her, and a smile that spreads slow and easy, like butter over toasted bread. 'Life is one sweet surprise and I'm busy living it,' that smile says.

2025 HURRICANE SEASON Returning Home After a Hurricane

Eastern Pacific: May 15-November 30 | Atlantic: June 1-November 30 | Central Pacific: June 1-November.

- Pay attention to local officials for information and special instructions.
- Be careful during clean up. Wear protective clothing, use appropriate face coverings or masks if cleaning mold or other debris. People with asthma and other lung conditions and/or immune suppression should not enter buildings with indoor water leaks or mold growth that can be seen or smelled, even if these individuals are not allergic to mold. Children should not help with disaster cleanup work.
- Wear protective clothing and work with someone else.
- Do not touch electrical equipment if it is wet or if you are standing in water. If it is safe to do so, turn off electricity at the main breaker or fuse box to prevent electric shock.
- Do not wade in flood water, which can contain dangerous pathogens that cause illnesses. This water also can
 contain debris, chemicals, waste and wildlife. Underground or downed power lines also can electrically
 charge the water.
- Save phone calls for emergencies. Phone systems often are down or busy after a disaster. Use text messages or social media to communicate with family and friends.
- Document any property damage with photographs. Contact your insurance company for assistance.

Take an Active Role in Your Safety Go to Ready.gov/hurricanes and use FEMA's Guide for Alerts and Warnings to learn more about hurricane watches and warnings. Download the FEMA app to get more information about how to prepare.


