CAFCI's 19th Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Celebration Themed "A Time for Hope, Peace, Joy & Love"

On January 18th, Caribbean-American For Community Involvement (CAFCI), in collaboration with the Village of Royal Palm Beach and supported by a grant from the Cultural Council of Palm Beach County, presented its nineteenth annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Celebration. The event was live streamed from the Royal Palm Beach Cultural Center and viewed from the CAFCI Facebook page by a large audience. The program was a mixture of prerecorded and live performances with a small socially distanced audience.

The event began with the flag ceremony by BSA Troop 111 of Royal Palm Beach followed by Steve Higgins' beautiful rendition of the national anthem. The Chair of the Cultural Committee, Elet Cyris, welcomed the audience and

Student Assistance Fund Committee Raise Funds for Scholarships

On behalf of the SAF Committee, a special thanks to everyone who collected and donated shoes for the shoe fundraiser. Your support towards helping us collect 2,500 (plus an additional 300) pairs of shoes was amazing especially in light of the pandemic. Special thanks to Golden Krust and Claudette Depass for providing drop-off locations. Thanks to Winsom Martin, Kathleen Lannaman and Nova Brown for helping the SAF Committee with bagging. Special mention to those CAFCI members who did their very own collection drive on our behalf. Special mention to members of: Grace Episcopal Church; The Church of Jesus Christ Lake Worth (donated twenty three bags of shoes) and St. Paul AME Church in West Palm Beach. This was such a satisfying and rewarding project for CAFCI and the Committee. The fundraiser was organized through the Funds2Orgs Group and some of the benefits of your shoe donation are outlined below.

Funds2Orgs: Most people do not know that shoes and clothing can be repurposed. Eighty five percent of consumer textiles end up in landfills, which is extremely harmful to the environment. Consumers are the primary reason for textiles ending up in landfills. Approximately 50 percent of collected shoes and clothing are re-used around the world. Seventy percent of the global population uses repurposed shoes and clothing. The gently worn, used and new shoes that are collected by the thousands of partners of the Funds2Orgs Group shoe drive fundraising brands are consolidated and shipped to many micro-enterprise partners around the world, where they are sold to small business owners for a low price. The Funds2Orgs Group seeks to provide an opportunity for people to help themselves out of poverty. We do not just give away the shoes, as this would decimate the local market for shoes and clothing and destroy local jobs. Additionally, some developing countries, particularly in Africa, do not permit apparel to be given away. It is for these reasons that the Funds2Orgs





Group promotes commerce and business for small business owners. Shoes are sold by these small business owners in communities in need of proper footwear at an inexpensive price. Additionally, micro-entrepreneurs create a path out of poverty for themselves in countries where there are limited, if any, job opportunities that pay a living wage. Haiti is one of the countries where the Funds2Orgs Group ships the shoes that are collected in shoe drive fundraisers across North America. According to reporting by the World Bank, Haiti is the most impoverished country in the Western Hemisphere. It is the third largest country in the Caribbean, after the Dominican Republic and Cuba. Of the country's population of 10.4 million people, over 6 million (59 percent) live below the national poverty level of \$2.41 USD per day. Twenty four percent of the population, or 2.5 million people, live below the national extreme poverty line, which is \$1.23 USD. Inflation is high in Haiti, and the average per capita income is \$480 USD annually, compared to \$33,550 in the United States. For more information, visit funds2orgs.com.



CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORY MONTH



Since 1976, every American president has designated **February as Black History Month** and endorsed a specific theme. The theme for this year, "Black Family: Representation, Identity and Diversity," explores the African diaspora and the spread of Black families across the United States.

Black History Month honors the contributions of African Americans to U.S. history. Among prominent figures are Madam C.J. Walker, who was the first U.S. woman to become a self-made millionaire;

George Washington Carver, who derived nearly 300 products from the peanut; Rosa Parks, who sparked the Montgomery Bus Boycott and galvanized the Civil Rights Movement; and Shirley Chisholm, who was the first African American woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives.

The celebration of <u>Black History Month</u> began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Dr. <u>Carter G. Woodson</u>, a noted African American historian, scholar, educator and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976. The month of February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of <u>Frederick Douglass</u> and <u>Abraham Lincoln</u>.

NAACP: On February 12, 2019, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) marked its 110th anniversary. Spurred by growing racial violence in the early 20th century, and particularly by 1908 race riots in Springfield, Illinois, an interracial group of white liberal/progressives and seven African Americans joined together to form a new permanent civil rights organization, the NAACP. February 12, 1909 was chosen because it was the centennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln.

Heavyweight Champ: <u>Jack Johnson</u> became the first African American man to hold the World Heavyweight Champion boxing title in 1908. He held onto the belt until 1915.

Famous Protestors and Activists: While <u>Rosa Parks</u> is credited with helping to spark the <u>civil rights movement</u> when she refused to give up her public bus seat to a white man in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955—inspiring the <u>Montgomery Bus Boycott</u>—the lesser-known <u>Claudette Colvin</u> was arrested nine months prior for not giving up her bus seat to white passengers.

Supreme Court Justice: Thurgood Marshall was the first African American ever appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson and served on the court from 1967 to 1991.

Eminent Scientist: George Washington Carver developed 300 derivative products from peanuts among them cheese, milk, coffee, flour, ink, dyes, plastics, wood stains, soap, linoleum, medicinal oils and cosmetics.

First Senator: <u>Hiram Rhodes Revels</u> was the first African American ever elected to the <u>U.S. Senate</u>. He represented the state of <u>Mississippi</u> from February 1870 to March 1871.

First Woman Representative: Shirley Chisholm was the first African American woman elected to the <u>House of Representatives</u>. She was elected in 1968 and represented the state of <u>New York</u>. She broke ground again four years later in 1972 as the first woman and African American to seek the nomination for president of the United States from one of the two major political parties.

Self-Made Millionaire: Madam C.J. Walker was born on a cotton plantation in Louisiana and became wealthy after inventing a line of African American hair care products. She established Madame C.J. Walker Laboratories and was also known for her philanthropy.

Oscar Winner: In 1940, <u>Hattie McDaniel</u> was the first African American performer to win an Academy Award—the film industry's highest honor—for her portrayal of a loyal slave governess in *Gone With the Wind*.

First Professional Black Baseball Player: On April 5, 1947, <u>Jackie Robinson</u> became the first African American to play Major League Baseball when he joined the Brooklyn Dodgers. He led the league in stolen bases that season and was named Rookie of the Year.

First Black Billionaire: Before Oprah Winfrey and Michael Jordan joined the billionaire's club, Robert Johnson became the first African American billionaire when he sold the cable station he founded, Black Entertainment Television (BET) in 2001.

First Black President: In 2008, Barack Obama became the first Black president of the United States.

First Black Vice President: In 2021, <u>Kamala Harris</u> became the first woman of African or Asian descent to become vice president. Harris' mother immigrated to the United States from India and her father immigrated from Jamaica.

- Improve your password protection Many online retailers, financial companies and service providers offer "dual-factor authentication." It takes an extra step, but it's a veritable fortress of extra security.
- Protect your mail Informed Delivery is a free service from the U.S. Postal Service in which the agency sends, via email, images of letter-sized mail expected to be delivered to you soon. This is a great way to monitor that nothing is stolen by ID thieves from your mailbox. Visit InformedDelivery.usps.com to sign up.
- Check your credit report Because of the pandemic, all three
 major credit reporting agencies Equifax, Experian and
 TransUnion are offering free weekly online reports through
 April 2021. You will be able to determine if someone is using
 credit in your name and to fix mistakes. Go to
 AnnualCreditReport.com.
- Filter your phone calls To help curtail the flood of spam calls, enter all your trusted contacts into your smartphone. This way, when the phone rings, your caller ID will let you know if it's one of them. Do not answer if you don't know the callers; if it's important, they will leave a message.
- Manage your emails Start marking as spam any suspicious or unwanted emails that show up in your inbox, so similar messages will be automatically routed to the trash.

- Vet unfamiliar e-retailers Before purchasing something from a
 retailer you haven't used before, do a web search for the
 company's name, followed by the words "scam," "fraud" and
 "complaints," in order to get a fast read on its veracity. Then
 read other user reviews. Also read the About page on the
 company's website to find out who owns it and where it's based.
 It's better to know that the businesses you buy from can help
 you avoid any fraudulent deals.
- Say no to gift cards Prepaid gift cards have become one of the fastest-growing requested forms of payment from criminals, and they are virtually untraceable. Take the pledge: "I will never, ever, ever buy a gift card for someone I don't know." Gift cards should only be purchased for family and friends.
- Copy all the contents of your wallet today This is a simple way
 to protect yourself from identity theft and credit card fraud. If you
 have copies of the front and back of all ID and credit cards
 stored in a safe place, you'll have the account numbers and
 customer service lines instantly available.
- Stop, breathe, ask Often, scammers rush their victims and push lots of emotional hot buttons to get you to stop thinking rationally. AARP's anti-fraud experts agree: Never let strangers force you into fast decisions. Pause, calm yourself, and think clearly and critically. Chances are you'll quickly see the situation for what it really is.
