PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Over the last few months, we have been fighting the Covid-19 virus that has kept us apart and forced us to cancel most of our community events. In recent days, we watched the gruesome images repeatedly as four police officers ended the life of another human being, a black man. You are probably angry. The images have outraged almost everyone. But especially if you are a black man, you could see yourself in George Floyd. Or if you are a black woman, you could see a brother, a son, an uncle or a father in George Floyd. These events caused me to reflect on our goals and purpose here at CAFCI. I believe it is important to remind all of us why we function as an organization.

The primary purpose and objectives are to:

- Create an atmosphere and sponsor events that lead to respect and mutual understanding among the ethnic groups in our community.
- Seek out, recognize and support persons of Caribbean ancestry residing in the region.
- Encourage involvement with other groups spearheading projects that are likely to improve the quality of life in the community at large.
- Promote and/or positively respond to multicultural events which complement our efforts and enhance our objectives and values.
- Contribute to educational and humanitarian needs as warranted.

Change begins with us. As a 501(c)(3) organization, we strive for racial equity as a fundamental belief. We have a responsibility to speak out against the injustices that lead to racial disparities in our country and our communities. "To remain silent is to be complicit."

CARIBBEAN HERITAGE MONTH

June is National Caribbean-American Heritage Month which honors the contributions of those with island roots – and there are a lot of them. Who are these Caribbean American people? We come in all shapes, sizes, colors, faiths and tongues. We are your neighbors and coworkers. We build walls and care for the sick. We are your contractors and landscapers. We inspire the world with music, visual arts, literature and dance. We innovate and own businesses across America. We teach and preach. We arrived at a region voluntarily and involuntarily. We legislate, govern and advocate. We have been shaping America for generations. The mission of National Caribbean-American Heritage Month is to promote the rich culture and heritage of the Caribbean-American people and their contribution to the United States of America. From John Russworm, who co-published the first Black newspaper, to James Weldon Johnson, to General Colin Powell, Hon. Shirley Chisholm, Cicely Tyson, Sanya Richards-Ross and so many more.

JUNETEENTH

(A combination of June and nineteenth)

On June 19, 1865, the Emancipation Proclamation — which had been issued on January 1, 1863 — was read to enslaved African Americans in Texas by Union Army General, Gordon Granger. Texas was the last Confederate State to have the proclamation announced after the end of the American Civil War in April of that year.

"Juneteenth is a day of reflection, a day of renewal, a pridefilled day. It is a moment in time taken to appreciate the African American experience. It is inclusive of all races, ethnicities and nationalities - as nothing is more comforting than the hand of a friend."

"Juneteenth serves symbolically, and in reality, as a reference point from which to measure and appreciate the progress and contributions made by African Americans to this society."

"Juneteenth is a day on which honor and respect is paid for the sufferings of slavery. It is a day on which we acknowledge the evils of slavery and its aftermath. On Juneteenth we talk about our history and realize because of it, there will forever be a bond between us."

"On Juneteenth we think about that moment in time when the enslaved in Galveston, Texas received word of their freedom. We imagine the depth of their emotions, their jubilant dance and their fear of the unknown."

"Juneteenth is a day that we commit to each other the needed support as family, friends and co-workers. It is a day we build coalitions that enhance African American economics."

"On Juneteenth we come together young and old to listen, to learn and to refresh the drive to achieve. It is a day where we all take one step closer together - to better utilize the energy wasted on racism. Juneteenth is a day that we pray for peace and liberty for all."

THE HISTORY OF FATHER'S DAY

Father's Day has relatively light roots—and was actually created by a woman. According to History.com, back in 1909, a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, "tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents." She went around to local businesses to gather support for her idea, and on June 19, 1910, the state of Washington celebrated the first ever Father's Day.

Although the event inspired President Woodrow Wilson and President Calvin Coolidge to urge Americans to acknowledge a day for dads during their administrations, it still wasn't an official holiday. Unfortunately, the enthusiasm for the commemoration didn't last long. During the '20s and '30s, people tried to do away with both Mother's Day and Father's Day and replace them with Parents' Day instead.

Then, during the Great Depression, retailers made a push to commercialize the holiday in an attempt to make money during dire financial times. And as World War II started, people began to use Father's Day as a way to pay respect to American troops.

Finally, several decades later, on May 1, 1972, President Richard Nixon signed Proclamation 4127, which declared Father's Day as a national holiday, with the first official celebration on June 18, 1972. "Let each American make this Father's Day an occasion for renewal of the love and gratitude we bear to our fathers, increasing and enduring through all the years," he wrote in the document.





Atlantic Hurricane Season June 1-November 30

Ready or not, hurricane season is here! To be sure you are prepared here are some tips. Click on the blue underlined text for more detailed information. For complete information, visit https://www.ready.gov/hurricanes.

Know your Hurricane Risk

Hurricanes are not just a coastal problem. Find out how rain, wind, water could happen where you live so you can start preparing now.

Make an Emergency Plan

Make sure everyone in your household knows and understands <u>your hurricane plan</u>. Discuss the latest <u>Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidance on Coronavirus (COVID-19)</u> and how it may affect your hurricane planning. Don't forget a plan for the <u>office, kids' daycare</u>, and anywhere you frequent.

Gather Supplies

<u>Have enough supplies</u> for your household, include medication, disinfectant supplies, <u>cloth face coverings</u>, <u>pet supplies</u> in your go bag or car trunk.

Those with Disabilities

If you or anyone in your household is an <u>individual with a disability</u> identify if you may need additional help during an emergency.

Know your Evacuation Zone

You may have to evacuate quickly due to a hurricane. <u>Learn your evacuation routes</u>, practice with household, pets, and identify where you will stay.

Recognize Warnings and Alerts

Have several ways to receive alerts. <u>Download the FEMA app</u> and receive real-time alertsfrom the National Weather Service for up to five locations nationwide. <u>Sign up for community alerts</u> in your area and be aware of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA)- which requires no-sign up.

Review Important Documents

Make sure your <u>insurance policies and personal documents</u> like ID are up to date. Make copies and keep them in a secure password protected digital space.

Strengthen your Home

Declutter drains and gutters, bring in outside furniture, consider hurricane shutters.

Get Tech Ready

Keep your cell phone charged when you know a hurricane is in the forecast and purchase backup charging devices to power electronics.

Help your Neighborhood

Check with neighbors, <u>senior adults</u>, or those <u>who may need additional help</u> securing hurricane plans to see how you can be of assistance to others.

Prepare your Business

Make sure your business has a <u>continuity plan</u> to continue operating when disaster strikes.
