CAFCI Scouts B3A Troop 111 WHAT A SUMMER!! In June our local council's summer camp was cut short,

but Woodruff, our away camp, definitely made up for it. Upon arrival, our guide gave us a tour and then we were off to our swim test. After dinner the base camp and high adventure scouts separated until the end of the week.

Base Camp Scouts walked an average of 20,000-30,000 steps daily, enjoyed delicious buffet style meals and attended merit badge classes like miscommunication (yes, miscommunication) and horseback riding. Everyone had a great time and enjoyed a real treat of delicious Beignets at cracker barrel (not to be confused with Cracker Barrel Restaurant) prepared by the Troop sharing our site.

These Scouts also enjoyed an exciting whitewater adventure on the Nantahala River. The chilly temperature of the river was a refreshing break for the summer heat. It was a cold, exhausting experience for everyone, but each of the Scouts would gladly go back for another round!



Unfortunately, the weather was not always cooperative as there were afternoon mountain storms. However, our base camp SPL, Caleb McNally, made the best of it by having the scouts take shelter in the concrete bathhouse and play games until the storm passed.

One morning at 5:30 AM, Mr. McNally, our Scoutmaster, and two of our Scouts participated in the traditional Woodruff "Polar Bear Plunge". They returned just before the temperature dropped to the 60's. Thanks to these fearless scouts for representing Troop 111!

In the afternoons, Scouts were able to create their own adventure as they returned to favorite parts of the Camp to do some more exploration on their own or with a buddy.

The High Adventure Scouts traveled a bit further to North Carolina where we met new friends from Troop 78 in Cumming,

Georgia and Troop 852 from Mesquite, Texas. Unlike the base camp scouts, we slept in air-conditioned cabins with bunk beds and plumbing. Breakfast at 7:30 am was followed by the Nantahala River Rafting adventure at 9 AM. The first round was guided with instruction on safety helmets, life jacket, up, down, forward, back and many other directions. After that we had an opportunity to self-guide which is where the true adventure began.

We tried out our new skills in the Tuckasegee River including testing every rock in the river to see if it could stop our raft. It was a great feeling to look back at the drop behind you to see what you really accomplished. We were also taken to a secret location found by our team, so it was a nice treat to show off our new Duckies and Kayak skills on the bumps and fountains. The Nantahala River also had lots of excitement at every turn.

Our last day of guided rafting was a level 3-4 in the Ocoee River located in the Cherokee National Forest. There was no playing around on this ride. The rapids were back-to-back and before we knew it, the ride was over. What great memories were made on our high adventure! We traveled to base

camp to join the rest of the Troop for our final night then headed home in the morning!



Two other Scouts, Jackson Doeren and Jackson Eubanks, also did a separate high adventure at the Summit Betchtel Reserve in West Virginia. The scenic drive on the way took them on a ghost tour in Savannah, coal mine tour in West Virginia and even a relaxing game of mini golf along the way. Scouts and ASM's, Mrs. Doeren and Mr. Eubanks set up tents in a valley surrounded by majestic mountains. Rock climbing, repelling, hiking, BMX biking and skateboarding, ziplining, white water rafting, shooting sports and archery were all part of this incredible adventure. Like our Woodruff Scouts, this crew also encountered summer storms. Consequently, both Scouts are now masters of their newly acquired skill, playing the card game,

It's the unofficial end of summer, but it doesn't mean the fun has to end. There's also a reason why most Americans are off on Monday: <u>Labor Day</u> honors the hard-working citizens of the United States. So, while everyone is enjoying their barbeques and brews, impress friends and family by sharing some <u>fun facts about Labor Day</u>, like those below.

- 1. Labor Day is much more than just a day off of work. It started with Peter McGuire, who is considered the Father of the Labor Day holiday, according to Purple Trail. He was an Irish-American pioneer unionist who wanted citizens that "labored" all year long be acknowledged and have a day to relax.
- 2. He is credited with saying the following statement during a Central Labor Union on May 18,1882: "Let us have, a festive day during which a parade through the streets of the city would permit public tribute to American Industry."
- 3. Creators decided to pick the first week of September to honor Labor Day because the time is between the Fourth of July and Thanksgiving. The first Labor Day parade was held on Sept. 5, 1882, in New York City. And it wasn't on a Monday. It was a Tuesday.
- **4.** On average, Americans worked 12-hour days, seven days a week during the Industrial Revolution, local Colorado news station KUSA-TV wrote. And it wasn't just adults. Children as young as 5 or 6 years old worked in factories and mills throughout the nation.
- **5.** Labor Day is celebrated on a different day in most countries. Many choose May Day, which is on May 1, as their day to honor working people.

- **6.** It takes the average American nearly 30 minutes to get to their job. The average commute it 24.3 minutes, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said.
- 7. Why is it a fashion faux pas to wear white after Labor Day? Well, there's no need to worry anymore. Thanks to trendsetters like Diddy and J-Lo, wearing white all year long is acceptable.

HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE!!!
Atlantic Hurricane Season
June 1 - November 30

Be Prepared and ...

Know Your Hurricane Risk - Hurricanes are not just a coastal problem. Find out how rain, wind, water and even tornadoes could happen far inland from where a hurricane or tropical storm makes landfall. Start preparing now.

Make an Emergency Plan - Make sure everyone in your household knows and understands <u>your hurricane plans</u>. Include the <u>office, kids' day care, and anywhere else you frequent</u> in your hurricane plans. Ensure your business has a <u>continuity plan</u> to continue operating when disaster strikes.

Know your Evacuation Zone - You may have to evacuate quickly due to a hurricane if you live in an evacuation zone. <u>Learn your evacuation routes</u>, practice with your household and pets, and identify where you will stay.

Follow the instructions from local emergency managers, who work closely with state, local, tribal, and territorial agencies, and partners. They will provide the latest recommendations based on the threat to your community and appropriate safety measures.

Recognize Warnings and Alerts - Have several ways to receive alerts. <u>Download the FEMA app</u> and receive real-time alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five locations nationwide. <u>Sign up for community alerts</u> in your area and be aware of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA), which require no sign up.

Those with Disabilities - Identify if you may need additional help during an emergency if you or anyone else in your household is an <u>individual with a disability</u>.

Review Important Documents - Make sure your <u>insurance policies and personal documents</u>, such as ID, are up to date. Make copies and keep them in a secure password-protected digital space.

Strengthen your Home - De-clutter drains and gutters, bring in outside furniture, and consider hurricane shutters.

Get Tech Ready - <u>Keep your cell phone charged</u> when you know a hurricane is in the forecast and purchase backup charging devices to power electronics.

Help your Neighborhood - Check with neighbors, <u>senior</u> adults, or those who may need additional help securing hurricane plans to see how you can be of assistance to others **Gather Supplies** - <u>Have enough supplies</u> for your household, include medication, disinfectant supplies and <u>pet supplies</u> in your go bag or car trunk. You may not have access to these supplies for days or even weeks after a hurricane.

VOTE BY MAIL...Voting by mail is the easiest and most convenient way to vote. Make an online request that your ballot be mailed to you, or call 561.656.6200. Completing your ballot at home allows you to take your time making your selections. EARLY VOTING... Early Voting is another easy and convenient way to vote. Any eligible registered voter in Palm Beach County can vote in any of the Early Voting sites open. Early Voting differs from Election Day voting because, on Election Day, you must vote in the polling place assigned to your precinct.
