JAMAICA W. I.

Jean M. McKenzie Garvey has had a fantastic life; not because she was the wife of Marcus Garvey, Jr.—the elder son of Marcus Garvey, progenitor of the Back-to-Africa movement—but because she's been driven by enthusiasm and a fearless optimism that propels her to seek out new adventures.

Jean was born in Kingston, Jamaica, one of the rare Kingstonians who is not a transplant. She was 'born under the Clock,' as they used to say about those born at Kingston's Victoria Jubilee Hospital because of the hospital's proximity to a 33-foot-tall Victorian clock known as Half Way Tree Clock Tower.

One of five children, Jean's mother drilled into them that "education is a ticket out of poverty." Jean took that to heart. After marriage to her first love, she immigrated to the U.S., with him and their four-year-old daughter, so that he could study engineering, while she pursued a BBA (Bachelor of Business Administration) followed by an MBA (Master of Business Administration.)

It was an exciting time. While attending school, Jean worked as a secretary at the international headquarters of Philip Morris—then one of the world's largest food and beverage corporations—eventually becoming an analyst, then a senior analyst, and finally a manager in market research, and sales and pricing.

For a lifelong city girl, the company's location at 42nd and Park Avenue in Manhattan was ideal, allowing her to frequent museums and theater productions. It was a vibrant time, and she took full advantage of it.

After 14 years of marriage, Jean and her husband divorced. Eleven and a half year later she met Marcus Garvey, Jr. Though he was 15 years older than her, the two hit it off instantly. Two years later they got married.

Jean says it was one of her best decisions. They remained married for 31 years until he died five years ago.

"My life has had unexpected turns," she says marveling. "I never gave any thought to being in a historical family. It led me to places and experiences I never expected, but I embraced it; and Marcus always expressed his appreciation."

Although Jean had always traveled for work, once she married Marcus her travels increased exponentially, with trips to the Caribbean, Africa, the United Arab Emirates, Southeast Asia, and Europe for vacations or while he lectured.

There were responsibilities that came with being married to a Garvey. While he directed the UNIA—the Universal Negro Improvement Association—with its many chapters located throughout the U.S and abroad—she helped him with its administration.

She says, "He always let everyone know how happy and proud he was of me. He would say that I was the type of person he had always looked to marry."

Throughout their lives together Jean experienced singular moments: meeting the president of Ghana and Fidel Castro; having a luncheon conversation with Archbishop Desmond Tutu.

It all seems a bit mind-blowing, but she is unfazed by the glamour. More than anything she says she loved being in an evenly matched partnership with her husband.

Notwithstanding his death, life has far from slowed down. Jean travels constantly. Last year's vacation took her to Dubai, Bahrain, Abu Dhabi, and Qatar. This March she journeyed to Nepal, India, and the Maldives.

"I love my life," she says. "I've been blessed and I'm incredibly grateful. I have a daughter who calls me at least twice a day; a son-in-law who's always there for me; four lovely grandchildren; and multiple nieces and nephews who call me constantly. And guess what?" she laughs. "I have a new role in the family. I'm the matriarch. My uncle Edgar, who is 93 years young, is the patriarch!"

In addition to her travels, Jean is a veteran in volunteerism. She is active in her church, is a member of her high school alumni association, and supports several charities.

Jean moved to America in 1969 and has lived in Florida since 2002. She considers America home. Surprisingly, after some 22 years of attending CAFCI events, it's only recently that she became a member. She says, "I like their mission, their commitment to community service, and their professionalism. Perhaps it's the businesswoman in me, but I respect that."

Since her husband's death Jean has resumed using the name, McKenzie, in addition to Garvey. She says, "The one thing that has remained with me through everything is my maiden name. It's my way to acknowledge my roots and ancestry."

STUDENT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Students applying must have at least a cumulative 2.7 GPA and demonstrate continuous academic success in their high school tenure to be eliqible.
- Applicants must show that they have participated in school and community activities.
- Applicants must show interest in the Caribbean community.
- The monetary assistance is awarded to students who are going on to a college, university, or other accredited institution of higher learning.
- If selected, the student must provide proof of acceptance from the school before receiving the award.

NATIONAL STROKE AWARENESS MONTH

Learning F.A.S.T. Can Save Lives

When you spot a stroke warning sign, act fast. Recognizing the stroke warning signs and calling 911 immediately may make the difference between a strong recovery or longterm disability, survival or death.

Use the letters in F.A.S.T. to spot a Stroke

- F = Face Drooping Does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven?
- A = Arm Weakness Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms.
 Does one arm drift downward?
- S = Speech Difficulty Is speech slurred?
- T = Time to call 911 Stroke is an emergency. Every minute counts. Call 911 immediately. Note the time when any of the symptoms first appear.

2025 HURRICANE SEASON - PREPARE NOW!!!

Eastern Pacific: May 15-November 30 | Atlantic: June 1-November 30 | Central Pacific: June 1-November.

- KNOW YOUR AREA'S RISK of hurricanes and consider your personal risk of experiencing impacts.
- **REVIEW YOUR INSURANCE POLICY** for hurricane-related hazard coverage. Standard insurance policies do not cover flooding you may need to purchase additional policies.
- SIGN UP TO RECEIVE EMERGENCY ALERTS AND NOTIFICATIONS from your local emergency management office.

 Learn what common alerts and warnings mean before you are impacted by a hurricane.
- MONITOR WEATHER REPORTS and updates from the National Hurricane Center. Be on alert for heavy rain.
- PRACTICE GOING TO A SAFE SHELTER for high winds, such as a FEMA safe room, an International Code Council
 (ICC) 500 storm shelter or a small, interior windowless room in a sturdy building. Make sure your safe
 shelter is on the lowest level that will not be affected by floodwater.
- **DEVELOP AN EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION PLAN** that you can use to contact family, friends and neighbors during a hurricane. Plan to text or message because you may not be able to make or receive phone calls.
- **DEVELOP AN EVACUATION PLAN BASED ON YOUR EVACUATION ZONE.** Consider where you will evacuate to and how you will get there. Practice your plan using your evacuation route.
- GATHER ENOUGH FOOD, WATER AND EMERGENCY SUPPLIES to last you several days. Keep in mind each person's specific needs, including medication. Don't forget the needs of pets.
- **KEEP IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS IN A DRY, SAFE PLACE** such as a fireproof and waterproof box, and create password-protected digital copies.
- **PROTECT YOUR PROPERTY.** Install hurricane shutters or reinforce windows. Declutter drains and gutters. Secure outdoor items and furniture or move them indoors.
