March is National Reading Month and Women's History Month. Our quest speaker. Claudette Thompson, is a schoolteacher, poet. published author and performer who has dedicated writings to both reading and uplifting women. She will share with us wonderful anecdotes of attending school in Jamaica and the development of her passion for writing. Over her lifetime, her love of writing has culminated in her writing many stories as well as composing and compiling a collection of prose and poems. Now she has published her first book, Take the Wheel: English Literature Made Simple and Enjoyable. Claudette taught English Literature for many years and came to realize that many students do not enjoy reading, and therefore resent having to go to Literature class. It was out of this recognition that Take the Wheel was written and published. Ms. Thompson wanted the book to reach a wide Caribbean audience and so a GO FUND ME account was started in order to purchase and send 100 copies of *Take the Wheel* to Jamaica. The books will be placed in rural libraries where children will be able to benefit. She has also written a soon to be published book, Queens, Straighten Your Crown Stop Looking Down, a collection of poems dedicated to females who "lacked self-esteem and, in some cases, had allowed themselves to be abused." The general membership meeting will be dedicated to the importance of reading.



Student Assistance Award Program

Each year we offer deserving local high school graduates the opportunity to apply for a monetary "Student Assistance Award" from our organization.

Past student awards range from \$500 - \$1,500 per student.



Student Eligibility Requirements

- Students applying must have at least a cumulative 3.0 GPA and demonstrate continuous academic success in their high school tenure to be eligible.
- Applicants must show that they have participated in school and community activities.
- Applicants must show interest in the Caribbean community.
- The monetary assistance is awarded to students who are going on to a college, university, or other accredited institution of higher learning.
- If selected, the student must provide proof of acceptance from the school before receiving the award.

Award Ceremonies

Each year in May CAFCI holds an award ceremony for students, their families, members and friends of CAFCI.

We invite community leaders, guest speakers, Student Assistance Fund Committee members past and present, the general public and friends of CAFCI to attend and participate in the Event.

March is "Women's History Month"

Women's History Month is a dedicated month to reflect on the often overlooked contributions of women to United States history. From <u>Abigail Adams</u> to <u>Susan B. Anthony</u>, <u>Sojourner Truth</u> to <u>Rosa Parks</u>, the <u>timeline of women's history milestones</u> stretches back to the founding of the United States.

Women's History Month had its origins as a national celebration in 1981 when Congress passed Pub. L. 97-28 which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982 as "Women's History Week." Throughout the next five years, Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as "Women's History Week." In 1987, after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of March 1987 as "Women's History Month." Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1995, presidents have issued a series of annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month." These proclamations celebrate the contributions women have made to the United States and recognize the specific achievements women have made over the course of American history in a variety of fields. WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH FACTS

- 1. The first Women's History Day was held in 1909.
- 2. The day became Women's History Week in 1978.
- 3. In 1987, it became Women's History Month.
- 4. The president declares every March Women's History Month.
- 5. Every Women's History Month has a theme. The 2021 theme is "Valiant Women of the Vote: Refusing to Be Silenced."
- 6. Wyoming Territory was the first place to grant women the right to vote.
- 7. The 19th amendment didn't give all women the right to vote.
- 8. Claudette Colvin refused to give up her bus seat 9 months before Rosa Parks did.
- 9. Geraldyn "Jerrie" Cobb was the first woman to pass astronaut testing in 1961.
- 10. In 1983, Sally Ride was the first American woman in space.
- 11. Women couldn't get credit cards on their own until 1974.
- 12. Women make up 24 percent of Congress.
- 13. Women outnumber men as they get older.
- 14. More women are earning college degrees than men.
- 15. The gender pay gap still persists: Women make up 14.4 percent of active-duty military members. -- Women make up 46.8 percent of the labor force.
- 16. Hilary Clinton is the first woman to be nominated for <u>president of the United States</u> by a major political party and the first woman to win the popular vote in an American presidential election, however, she failed to win the <u>Electoral College</u>.
- 17. Marie Van Brittan Brown, along with her husband Albert Brown, invented the home security system in 1966.

VACCINE PRE-REGISTRATION SYSTEM NOW AVAILABLE


