Scholarship Application:

Students interested in applying must have at least a 3.0 GPA and must demonstrate continuous academic success through their high school tenure. Applicants must show that they have participated in school and community activities, and must also show an interest in the Caribbean community. The monetary assistance is awarded to students who plan to attend a college, university or other accredited institution of higher learning. Proof of acceptance from the prospective institution must accompany the application.

- Be a resident of Palm Beach County, Florida
- Currently attend high school in Palm Beach County, and is expecting to graduate within one year
- Demonstrate an interest in Caribbean-American affairs
- Provide a completed application **postmarked no later** than March 21, 2015

- Be available for an interview on April 18, 2015
- Be able to attend a presentation of awards ceremony, if selected, on May 16, 2015 at 7 pm


IN CELEBRATION OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH WE REMEMBER BOB MARLEY The world marks Bob Marley's legacy 70 years after his birth

On Friday February 6th, people around the world remembered Jamaican reggae icon Bob Marley on what would have been his 70th birthday. "His legacy is not complete. His influence continues to grow and expand. It has not met its full potential," Ray Hitchins, a lecturer in the Institute of Caribbean Studies at the University of West Indies, told Efe.

Born in 1945 in Nine Miles, the future superstar nurtured his musical skills during adolescence in Trench Town, a poor Kingston suburb, where he met the members of The Wailers. Marley's turn to writing songs about social and political issues followed a mid-1960s sojourn in the United States, where his mother was then living, according to Chris Salewicz, author of "Bob Marley: The Untold Story." "He worked in a car factory in Delaware in a time where racial segregation was very strong," Salewicz told Efe. The racial situation Marley encountered in the United States inspired the lyrics of many of the songs that he recorded with The Wailers on his return to Jamaica, the author said. But it was Island Records founder Chris Blackwell's strategy of emphasizing Marley's Rastafarian-tinged mystique that helped the 1972 album "Catch a Fire" gain international recognition. Stephen King, author of "Reggae, Rastafari and the Rhetoric of Social Control" said in an interview with Efe that the decision to deliver Marley's music via albums rather than singles - then the dominant form in Jamaica - contributed to the rapid globalization of reggae. Marley's songs about social transformation, rejection of colonialism and emancipation resonated in a decade of decolonization and national liberation struggles. "Reggae became the soundtrack for political dissent," said Carolyn Cooper, professor of Literary and Cultural Studies at the University of West Indies. Although he did not enjoy a special celebrity status in his native country, according to Hitchins, Bob Marley's music did manage to influence the Jamaican elections of 1972, 1976 and 1980. "Politicians started to use reggae and Rastafari to find a new market of voters, low class and middle class which in the end, paved the way for both reggae and Rastafari to be legitimized," King said. Hitchins said the artist was one of the first reggae singers to publicly embrace the Rastafari faith in a country where Rastas faced open discrimination. "Bob Marley definitely propelled the image of the Rastafari movements in the world and for that, we must give thanks," Burnet Sealy, chairman of the Caribbean Rastafari Organization, told Efe in a telephone interview.

In 1978, Bob Marley made his first trip to Africa, visiting Kenya and Ethiopia, the home of the late Emperor Haile Selassie, revered by Rastafarians as the second coming of the messiah. He returned to the continent in 1980 to perform at Zimbabwe's independence ceremony and at a subsequent free concert for some 80,000 people. The show in Zimbabwe was among the last Marley would ever perform, as he died May 11, 1981, after a long battle with cancer. He was 36. "One of the major attractions of Bob Marley's history is who he is, where he comes from and how he reached people," Hitchins said. Marley, according to Hitchins, is more famous now than before his death, due in large part to the systematic marketing - promoted by his own family - of his image and brand to the point of making it a "synonym for Jamaica." The sale of T-shirts, albums, coffee and even cannabis under the brand of Bob Marley indicate that the reggae icon's popularity will only increase, Hitchins said. In his opinion, Marley is "the most significant figure of the culture of Jamaica" and the singer's homeland is celebrating the 70th anniversary of his birth with a symposium at the museum that bears his name and a massive tribute concert in Kingston. In many other corners of the world, from Pennsylvania to Dubai, San Juan to Bucharest, there are activities planned to commemorate Marley's life and anthems such as "One Love," "No Woman, No Cry" and "Exodus." The Grammy Museum in Los Angeles proclaimed Feb. 6 as Bob Marley Day, while Universal Music plans to launch on Feb. 17 a never-before-released CD and video from a 1978 Marley concert in Boston. EFE
