THE HISTORY OF MARTIN LUTHER KING DAY

It took 15 years to create the federal Martin Luther King, Jr., holiday. Congressman John Conyers, Democrat from Michigan, first introduced legislation for a commemorative holiday four days after King was assassinated in 1968. After the bill became stalled, petitions endorsing the holiday containing six million names were submitted to Congress.

Conyers and Rep. Shirley Chisholm, Democrat of New York, resubmitted King holiday legislation each subsequent legislative session. Public pressure for the holiday mounted during the 1982 and 1983 civil rights marches in Washington.

Congress passed the holiday legislation in 1983, which was then signed into law by President Ronald Reagan. A compromise moving the holiday from Jan. 15, King's birthday, which was considered too close to Christmas and New Year's, to the third Monday in January helped overcome opposition to the law

- 1973 Illinois is first state to adopt MLK Day as a state holiday
- 1983 Congress passes, President Reagan signs, legislation creating Martin Luther King, Jr. Day
- 1986 Federal MLK holiday goes into effect
- 1987 Arizona governor Evan Mecham rescinds MLK Day as his first act in office, setting off a boycott of the state.
- 1989 State MLK holiday adopted in 44 states
- 1991 The NFL moves the 1993 Super Bowl site from Phoenix, Ariz., to Pasadena, Calif., because of the MLK Day boycott.
- 1992 Arizona citizens vote to enact MLK Day. The Super Bowl is held in Tempe, Ariz. in 1996.
- For the first time, MLK Day is held in some form—sometimes under a different name, and not always as a paid state holiday—in all fifty states.
- 1999 New Hampshire becomes the last state to adopt MLK Day as a paid state holiday, replacing its optional Civil Rights Day.
- 2000 Utah becomes the last state to recognize MLK Day by name, renaming its Human Rights Day state holiday.
 South Carolina becomes the last state to make MLK Day a paid holiday for all state employees. Until now, employees could choose between celebrating it or one of three Confederate-related holidays.



End of the year Youth Report For CAFCI's Troop 111

The Troop 111 Family is growing...

This year they welcomed 8 new scouts into Troop 111's family, bringing the number of active scouts to 41, along with 1 Scoutmaster, 10 active Assistant Scout Masters, and 11 Committee members.



2014 Campouts

During this past year, the Troop attended two summer camps. Their first summer camp was at Tanah Keeta where they had 27 scouts and 5 Assistant Scout Masters attend. During the week the Troop earned a perfect score every day for camp inspections. One scout received the Climbing Camper of the week. A team of older scouts placed third in the triathlon. To top off a fun week, Troop 111won the SPL/ Scoutmaster Challenge.

A couple of weeks later, 18 Scouts and four Assistant Scout Masters attended their second summer camp in Rainey Mountain, North Georgia. Three scouts went on the Epic Adventure where they went horseback riding, whitewater rafting, mountain backpacking and swimming, high ropes course, climbing tower and rappelling. One scout took the COPE course, the Challenging Outdoor Personal Experience that teaches teamwork, confidence building, and challenge by choice, leadership and initiative. Three scouts went on the Scoutland Aquatic Outpost where they learned motor boating, water skiing, sailing, and whitewater canoeing. One scout went on the Gold Rush adventure, where he lived in the 1800's for the week, living like the early settlers. He slept in a rustic cabin built in true pioneer fashion, learned tomahawk and knife throwing, mountain basketry, black powder rifle, fishing, blacksmithing, period craft and art, and learned the history and heritage.

The Scouts also had planned Campouts at **Fort Wilderness**, and **Camp Sikorsky** where they worked on the aviation, composites, engineering and fire safety merit badges. They hiked and learned skills at **Camp Dupuis**; worked on the oceanography and railroad merit badges at **Camp Pigeon Key**; and worked on skills and the line rescue for rank advancement at Campgrounds on the **Fort Pierce Inlet**. During the **Highlands Hammock campout**, they had patrol competitions that consisted of four stations: first aid, camp gadgets, emergency shelter/ knots, and camp set-up/fire making station. Typical Troop 111 style, they completed a service project for the Campgrounds, and had a cooking competition.

Finally, to celebrate Troop 111's Birthday in November, they had an awesome Surprise Mystery Campout in Orlando where the Scouts were treated to Islands of Adventure and Universal Studios.

Once again, the Troop participated in the Gigantic Garage Sale, where scouts made a total of \$1,244.

With a better understanding of the challenges that we face (ability to finance the property without one or more guarantor(s) and zoning constraints in non-commercial areas where the prices are not as high), our strategy and approach is being looked at and revised. Suggestions are welcome; especially if you have expertise in the area of fund raising or creative ways of acquiring commercial property.



Until such time, we are looking to *purchase land for cash and then build, or find a location with a lease to own option*. In either case the property would have to be in an area with the appropriate zoning or where it could be changed relatively easily.
